#### RED LAKE WATERSHED DISTRICT Board of Manager's Minutes December 9, 2021

President Dale M. Nelson called the meeting to order at 9:00 a.m. at the Red Lake Watershed District Office, Thief River Falls, MN.

Present: Managers: Dale Nelson, Terry Sorenson, LeRoy Ose, Tom Anderson. Gene Tiedemann and Allan Page. Absent: Brian Dwight. Staff Present: Myron Jesme, Tammy Audette and Legal Counsel, Delray Sparby.

The Board reviewed the agenda. A motion was made by Ose, seconded by Anderson, and passed by unanimous vote that the Board approve the agenda. Motion carried.

The Board reviewed the November 24, 2021, minutes. Motion by Tiedemann, seconded by Page, to approve the November 24, 2021, Board meeting minutes as presented. Motion carried.

The Board reviewed the Financial Report dated December 8, 2021. Motion by Sorenson, seconded by Tiedemann, to unanimously approve the Financial Report dated December 8, 2021. Motion carried.

Staff member, Ann Joppru, reviewed the General Fund Budget as of November 30, 2021.

The Board reviewed Pay Estimate No. 2 in the amount of \$289,394.99 to Spruce Valley Corporation, Inc., for the Thief River Falls Oxbow Project and Stormwater Treatment Project, RLWD Project No. 46Q. Engineer, Dillion Nelson, stated that the project is 98% complete. The Contractor will complete site grading and seeding in the Spring. Motion by Ose, seconded by Tiedemann, to approve Pay Estimate No. 2 in the amount of \$289,394.99 to Spruce Valley Corporation, Inc., for the Thief River Falls Oxbow Project and Stormwater Treatment Project, RLWD Project No. 46Q. Motion carried.

Quality Spray Foam/Anderson Excavating began hauling riprap to the site for the Schirrick Dam Outlet Repair, RLWD Project No. 25. The Contractor will also remove any trees that are falling in, within the work area.

Administrator Jesme stated that he completed the project update and final payment request for the CPL Grant for the BR 6 Wildlife Habitat Structure, RLWD Project No. 43A.

Aly Bergstrom, Beltrami SWCD, appeared virtually before the Board to discuss a Forest Stewardship cost share proposal for Beltrami County landowners. Bergstrom explained that a forest stewardship plan is largely a "foot in the door" for a landowner to become enrolled in one of two conservation incentive programs. These programs provide forest protection through the life of the contract. Bergstrom stated that there are scientific reports that point out the correlation between a catchment that is 75% protected and improved water quality. Forest stewardship plans and subsequent conservation incentive programs increase protected lands on the landscape. Bergstrom is requesting cost share in the amount of \$5,400, which would account for Red Lake Watershed District December 9, 2021 Page **2** of **3** 

approximately 1,000 acres of forested property, with landowners paying a 60% cost share. Motion by Sorenson, seconded by Page, to approve a cost-share in the amount of \$5,400 with the Beltrami SWCD for a Forest Stewardship Program from the District's Water Quality Project funds, RLWD Project No. 46. Motion carried.

Engineer Nate Dalager, HDR Engineering, Inc., stated that the walkway on the Pine Lake Flood Damage and Fish Habitat Project, RLWD Project No. 26B will be installed next week, with the gates arriving January 27, 2022. District staff will install a road gate next spring. Dalager indicated that as part of the specification for the concrete structure, there is a 28-day break test and a 56-day break test. Both tests have failed the required specifications, however the 56-day break test did improve from the 28-day test. Dalager has determined that given how the project is designed, there is very little risk of dam failure however there may be a basic risk of early deterioration over time. Dalager has been in discussion with Davidson, who indicated they will provide an extended warranty of 10 years, in writing, along with additional testing being completed in the spring.

The District received a call from The Nature Conservancy staff regarding ditching on their property without their approval, as well as their concerns that there may be a wetland violation. Administrator Jesme recommended that if The Nature Conservancy felt there was a wetland violation, they should contact local Wetland Conservation Act staff members regarding possible wetland violations, and he felt the ditching on private land could be a trespassing issue. Legal Counsel Sparby agreed that this is most likely a civil issue and that there is most likely no jurisdiction for the District on this issue.

The Board reviewed correspondence from the RRWMB regarding cost share payments due for USGS stream gauge sites. Motion by Ose, seconded by Sorenson, to approve payment in the amount of \$11,675.00, to the RRWMB, for cost share on USGS stream gauge sites. Motion carried.

The Board reviewed a posting from the Environmental Quality Board regarding Public Board Member positions.

Administrators Update:

- The RRWMB Legislative Open House and Board meeting will be held on December 14, 2021 in Ada. Jesme will participate virtually.
- Staff member, Joppru, has been working with Brady Martz & Associates in regard to the District's accounting software.
- Six RLWD staff participated in the MAWD Annual Conference. Jesme and Engineer, Nordby, gave a presentation on the Black River Impoundment.
- The Minnesota Association of Water District Administrators Legislative Committee met via Zoom on December 10<sup>th</sup>.
- The Red Lake River 1W1P Advisory Committee and Policy Committee will meet on December 15, 2021 at the District office. The 2018 Watershed Based grant funding final billing will be completed.

- The Clearwater River Planning Workgroup will meet on December 15<sup>th</sup> to discuss various items in the plan development.
- Jesme and Engineers Nordby and Dalager presented the Black River Impoundment and the Pine Lake Flood Damage Reduction and Habitat Project to the Red River Flood Damage Reduction Workgroup on December 8<sup>th</sup>.
- The Mud River Project Team will meet on December 17<sup>th</sup> at 8:30 a.m. at the District office.

Legal Counsel Sparby stated that he has not heard from Attorney Mark Grainger regarding the stipulation of facts for the Improvement to Polk County Ditch 39, RLWD Project No. 179.

Legal Counsel Sparby will work with District staff regarding state deed tax and eCRV information for the Sorvig property on the Black River Impoundment, RLWD Project No. 176.

Motion by Ose, seconded by Anderson, to adjourn the meeting. Motion carried.



#### **Red Lake Watershed District - Administrators Report**

#### December 23, 2021

**Red River Watershed Management Board** – LeRoy, Tom, Terry and Allan (live) and I (virtual) attended the RRWMB Legislative session which started at 10:00 am December 14<sup>th</sup>. LeRoy and I also attended the RRWMB regular Board meeting which started after lunch. I have included in your packet the RRWMB Legislative Priorities for your review.

**QuickBooks Online Software** – Ann is continuing to work with Alexandrea Schwab, Brady Martz & Associates. We have received the checks as well as the printer for the checks.

**Minnesota Association of Watershed District Legislative Committee** – The MAWD Legislative Committee met via Zoom at 3:00 pm December 15<sup>th</sup>. Some of the items were to review existing and new resolutions. We also assisted in preparing recommendation for a final platform for the 2022 season. I had to leave the meeting prior to completing the final platform. I have attached the Resolution Hearing results as well as the MAWD Awards for 2021.

**Knutson Dam** – HDR staff, Jason Boyle, MnDNR Dam Safety, and I met at 9:00 am December 16<sup>th</sup> to review the old plans as well as share what the new structure would most likely consist of. Jason asked for the meeting so he could get a better handle on what MnDNR permit, if any, would be required for construction.

#### **2021** Resolutions Hearing Results



The following resolutions were adopted at the MAWD Annual Business Meeting held on December 3, 2021 via Zoom.

#### Resolution #1A SWCD Capacity Fund Sources – Passed (as amended)

• MAWD supports SWCD capacity funds to come from county and state general funds.

#### Resolution #1B Clean Water Funds for Implementation, Not Capacity – Passed (as amended)

• MAWD supports Clean Water Funds being used for implementation and not for capacity.

#### Resolution #2 Capacity Funding for Watershed Districts – Passed (as amended)

• MAWD supports capacity base funding resources directed to non-metro watershed districts who request this assistance, to implement the activities as outlined in approved watershed district water management plans or comprehensive watershed management plans.

#### Resolution #3 Increased Flexibility in Open Meeting Law - Passed (as amended)

- MAWD supports changes to the Open Meeting Law to provide greater flexibility in the use of interactive technology by allowing members to participate remotely in a nonpublic location that is not noticed, up to three times in a calendar year per manager.
- MAWD supports allowing public participation from a remote location by interactive technology, or alternatively from the regular meeting location where interactive technology will be made available for each meeting, unless otherwise noticed under Minnesota Statutes Section 13D.021.
- MAWD supports changes to the Open Meeting Law requiring watershed districts to prepare and publish procedures for conducting public meetings using interactive technology.

#### Resolution #4 Increased Flexibility in Open Meeting Law (version 2) – did not pass (combined into #3)

#### Resolution #5 Crop Insurance to Include Crop Losses Within Impoundment Areas - Passed

• MAWD supports expansion of Federal Multi-Peril Crop Insurance to include crop losses within impoundment areas.

#### Resolution #6 60-day review required for State Agencies on Policy Changes - Passed (as amended)

• MAWD supports requiring State Agencies to provide a meaningful, not less than 60-day review and comment period from affected local units of government on new or amended water management policies, programs, or initiatives with a response to those comments required prior to adoption.

#### Resolution #7 Metro WBIF for approved 103B plans only - Passed

 MAWD supports BWSR distribution of metro WBIF among the 23 WMOs with state-approved comprehensive, multi-year 103B watershed management plans. Those plans implement multijurisdictional priorities at a watershed scale and facilitate funding projects of any eligible local government unit (including soil and water conservation districts, counties, cities, and townships).

- **2. Farmstead Ring Dikes:** The RRWMB will request \$360,000 for farmstead ring dikes for member watershed districts with the recommended cost-share breakdown:
  - 50% State of Minnesota
  - 25% RRWMB
  - 12.5% member watershed district
  - 12.5% landowner
- **3. Re-invest in Minnesota (RIM) Program:** The RRWMB will support funding for RIM allocations to the RRB through the Lessard-Sams Outdoor Heritage Council. The RRWMB will work closely with its membership and appropriate state agencies on RIM.

Norman County East Summer Rec program participants took a guided tour of Fertile Sand Hills trails passing through both Death Valley 1 and Death Valley 2 while younger students followed the Sand Hill



River trail on their quest in search of items noted on their Scavenger Hunt list.



Story Strolls continued to be a popular activity in 2021, with kids and adults alike enjoying leisurely outdoor hikes while reading book pages posted along the scenic Sand Hill trails. Three

books were featured including How to Find a Bird displayed along the bird-friendly Sand Hill River trail.

A related interactive "Crack the Code" walk was done in partnership with the Fertile-Beltrami Early Childhood Initiative with kids solving riddles with clues given on the posted trail signs.



Story Strolls are an example of partnerships helping make programs happen. Librarian Laura Gullickson from the Fertile Public Library provides lead support in selection, purchasing and prep of the books. The Fertile-Beltrami Community Fund and Early Childhood Initiative have provided funding for supplies. The City of Fertile allows use of its Ranger for transport and installation/removal of the Story Stroll posts by Agassiz ELC staff and volunteers. THANKS ALL for making these popular Story Strolls possible.

#### Public Programs and activities onsite...

Public Programs were also provided to raise awareness of natural resource topics, especially as relates to the local environment of the Fertile Sand Hills. Two guided

hikes were provided including a popular pasque flower hike featuring the early blooming pasque—a special annual attraction of the Fertile Sand Hills. Large flowered beardtongue and spiderwort were two featured blooms on a June hike of the Fertile Sand Hills.



Monarch butterflies were featured in a fun and informative program provided by Laura Bell from the



University of MN Crookston . The life cycle of monarchs from egg to adult and their amazing migratory journey were just some of the many fascinating facts shared about this popular pollinator.

Another important pollinator and pest control friend—

bats, were featured at an August program presented by Amy Westmark, MnDNR Region 1 Nongame Wildlife Specialist. Five of the seven bat species found in Minnesota were detected in a "listening" session following the



program using a bat echo location meter.



A Mosaic Arts program was featured at the Nature Center with participants creating nature inspired artistic mosaics. Ada mosaic artist Elizabeth Rockstad provided guidance to the creative process enjoyed by 12 participants at the Nature Center.

# **Recreational Opportunities**

# Hike, Snowshoe, Paddle, Ride

Trail fees were again waived in 2021 to encourage public use for physical and mental wellbeing. While the Nature Center was closed for much of the year due to Covid, the bathrooms continue to

remain open 24/7 for public use with regular cleaning and disinfecting provided. The Nature Center is again available for group rentals.



Snowshoe trails on both sides of the Sand Hill River plus a trail out to Scout Tower provide excellent opportunity to explore in the shelter of wooded areas. The river trails are especially scenic with much of the river staying open yearround, attracting birds to the open water.

The snowshoe trail to Scout Tower has become



multi-purpose with rave reviews from mountain bike enthusiasts who have found it to be a great single track mountain bike trail. The mountain bike riders have been helping trim branches along all the snowshoe trails as they use them for

mountain biking rides.

Limited snow carried over into limited rain and drought conditions during the summer of 2021. Hitting rocks and getting stuck in low water is not fun and is hard on equipment—so kayak rentals did not happen last summer. We're looking forward to making the Agassiz ELC kayak "fleet" available in 2022 to enjoy the wonderful Sand Hill River trail in the Fertile area.

Fertile Maintenance Department staff took over much of the trail mowing in 2021 including mowing the snowmobile trail which serves as the designated trail for horseback riding in the Fertile Sand Hills.

# **Ski the Fertile Sand Hills**

With over 10 miles of groomed trails, the Fertile Sand Hills provides premier cross-country skiing for all. Casual skiers can enjoy flatter terrain along the scenic Sand Hill River trail. More advanced skiers can explore the hilly oak savanna and dunes terrain in the Sand Hills.



2021 marked a big improvement in ski trail grooming with the aid of a "new/used" Ginzugroomer and tracksetter which has "teeth" that can chew up old icy snow to recondition it and then set a new track. It really helped to make the most of our limited snow last winter.



**Youth Skiing** ~ The Sand Hills SkiSparks youth x-c ski club enjoyed their second year of ski instruction at the Fertile Sand Hills in 2021. Skiers from ages 4

to 16 learned and advanced their skills through drills and tips from adult leaders. It was great to see kids learn this fun life skill and



watch some of the "older" youngsters bombing down the steeper hills after their Sunday regular sessions. The Ski Sparks Ski Club will begin sessions again in January 2022. If interested, contact local club leader Matt Forgit at <u>sandhills@mysl.org</u>.

# Univ. of MN-Crookston Assists with Fertile Sand Hills Site Management

**Buckthorn control** was the hot topic featured at a demo/work day in October. The University of MN Crookston Natural Resources Club demonstrated cutting and stump treatment of this aggressive invasive shrub/tree, clearing an area of buckthorn



near the Nature Center.

Landowners from as far as Fargo and Thief River Falls came to learn about best control methods as



they seek to maintain diversity of their woodlands by controlling the spread of this aggressive invasive species. Watch for more buckthorn removal work days in 2022—VOLUNTEERS WELCOME! **Open sand management** is an ongoing strategy to promote continued survival of rare flora and fauna that require these fringe open sand areas to exist. Dr. Matt Simmons has involved students from his UofMN-Crookston Ecological Restoration class for many years helping to manage and monitor the open sand areas in the Fertile Sand Hills.

Death Valley 2 was the primary work area in 2021 with spraying



of vegetation as well as tree removal to enhance wind flow

and drying conditions to promote open sand areas.

Archery...after Covid cancellation in 2020, the



spring and fall 3D Archery Shoots were back in 2021 as coordinated by the Fertile Community Conservation Club. Archers were treated to two new areas utilizing snowshoe/bike trails for challenging target placement. The fall shoot attracted 130 archers from a 3 state area.

#### A prescribed burn of MnDNR and Fertile Sand

Hills property that was planned for 2021 was cancelled due to drought conditions and safety concerns. This is a MnDNR



high priority burn for spring of 2022. The Fertile Fire Department has burned portions of the City's Sand Hills property in the past to help control the spread of aspen and maintain a healthy oak savanna and prairie ecosystem. **Bluebird House** Full Occupancy! All ten of the bluebird boxes at the Agassiz ELC were occupied in 2021. Wrens and tree swallows each occupied 5 houses each by season's end, though bluebirds did use two of the boxes for initial broods.



**Pollinator Garden** renovation is underway as the area previously referred to as the botanical garden was sprayed in the fall to kill off the quack grass that had taken over. Spring 2022 plans include scraping off the top layer of soil and spraying again for any regrowth of quack grass before a heavy

mulch layer is applied and selected prairie and pollinator plants are planted. Watch for more details including volunteer

opportunities in the Spring newsletter.



Many more activities and developments took place or are in the works. It's been a busy year at the Agassiz ELC, with more in store for 2022!
